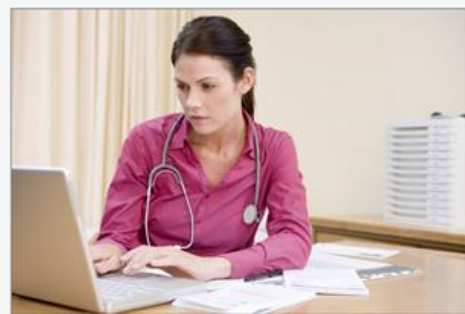


# What Is Bronchitis Allergy: Allergic Bronchitis

The study - led by Cardiff University in the UK - shows for the first time that the calcium-sensing receptor (CaSR) plays an integral role in causing the airway disease. Daniela Riccardi, principal investigator and a professor in Cardiff's School of Biosciences, describes their findings as "incredibly exciting," because for the very first time they've linked airway inflammation - which may be activated for example by cigarette smoke and car fumes - with airway twitchiness. She adds: "Our paper shows how these triggers release compounds that activate CaSR in airway tissue and drive asthma symptoms like airway twitchiness, inflammation, and narrowing.

Prof. Riccardi concludes: The researchers believe their findings about the function of CaSR in airway tissue could have significant implications for other respiratory conditions such as chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD), chronic bronchitis. The researchers, from Washington University School of Medicine in St. Louis, believe their findings will lead to treatments for a variety of disorders including asthma, COPD, cystic fibrosis and even certain cancers.

While people and smokers over 45 years of age are most likely to develop chronic bronchitis, babies, young kids, and the elderly have an elevated risk of developing acute bronchitis. Smoking is the most common cause of chronic bronchitis and may also result in acute bronchitis. Treatment for chronic bronchitis contains bronchodilators, anti-inflammatory drugs, for loosening mucus in the lungs and chest physical therapy.
